This is a Yiddish version of the original Hebrew song Ani Maamin, which professes belief in the coming of the Messiah. This in turn dates back to Maimonides, twelfth-century philosopher and physician, who compiled the Thirteen Articles of Faith, professing belief in God, the Prophets, Moses, Torah, and the coming of the Messiah.

The Hebrew Ani Maamim is based on Maimonides' Twelfth Principle: "I believe with perfect faith in the coming of the Messiah, and even though he may tarry, nevertheless, I wait each day for his coming." This was sung by many Jews during the Holocaust, in the ghettos, cattle cars, and death camps.
